#### Overview

Missouri continues to redesign and transform its Homeland Security program by consolidating and clarifying key program responsibilities in the Department of Public Safety (DPS). Dedicated resources are also provided by the Office of Homeland Security, National Guard, Highway Patrol, Fire Marshal, State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) and Capitol Police to accomplish the homeland security mission. The overall responsibility for Missouri's Homeland Security program falls under the Homeland Security Advisor, who is the Director of Public Safety and a Cabinet level official. The Governor's Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC) and the Regional Homeland Security Oversight Committees (RHSOC) work with the Office of Homeland Security to ensure seamless engagement and a feeling of ownership of Missouri's homeland security program at all levels. The Missouri Office of Homeland Security is the State Administrative Agency and is headed by the Homeland Security Coordinator who works closely with stakeholders to ensure a "one state-one strategy" program.

#### Impact of Homeland Security Funding and Programs to Date

##### *Principal Homeland Security Accomplishments*

- The Governor's Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC), comprised of several community entities, has established a framework of goals and cooperation, such as developing public-private partnerships, protecting critical infrastructures, interoperable communications, and earthquake preparedness, through the use of its quarterly regional committee meetings.
- Missouri continues to develop its "regionalization of homeland security" plan which is focused on establishing a logical governance structure and process, facilitating local, community level engagement in grant funding priorities and strategies, and other homeland security related decisions through the establishment of fourteen core disciplines.

##### *Principal Homeland Security Initiatives in Progress*

- Missouri continues to fine tune its Statewide Interoperability Network (MOSWIN) system, a P25 VHF (150 MHz 700-800 MHz dual band) trunked network, which covers all 114 counties including the City of St. Louis. This system provides local and county agencies with a "platform" to promote multi-discipline interoperable communications as well as providing internal communications capabilities to a number of State agencies. Use of this network will be cost free to agencies with the VHF Mobile P25 Trunked Radios.

- The Center for Education Safety (CES), a public-private partnership between the Missouri Department of Public Safety (DPS), the Missouri Office of Homeland Security, and the Missouri School Boards' Association (MSBA), located at Missouri's capital is continuing to sustain its mission of enhancing aspects of emergency planning, preparedness, and safety and security in public and private education from pre-K to post-secondary levels.
- Continued development of the Faith-Based Organization Disaster Initiative (FABODI) which encourages faith communities to prepare their members for a disaster by providing disaster relief training to faith based communities with an emphasis on individual and family preparedness, encouraging the development of continuity of operations plan (COOP) and encouraging each faith community to take on an external mission area such as sheltering, feeding or bulk distribution. Faith groups also provide critical relief to the survivors and volunteers during responses to emergencies as was seen during the response to the Joplin tornado disaster.
- Missouri has identified the potential of a catastrophic earthquake occurring because of the New Madrid fault zone in southeast Missouri that has the potential to affect millions of people and property in St. Louis, Missouri and Memphis, Tennessee. The lagging earthquake preparations and weak structured buildings have prompted the ongoing development of a statewide emergency operations plan that addresses preparation, mitigation, response and recovery from an earthquake disaster.

### **Recent Changes**

- A draft update of Missouri's State Homeland Security Strategy has been submitted. Updates include capability targets and assessments from the State THIRA and State Preparedness Report as well as additional input from each of the regional THIRAs and Regional Preparedness Reports that will be used to inform components of Presidential Policy Directive 8 and the National Preparedness Goal into Missouri's updated two-year State Homeland Security Strategy.
