Cyber Crime Program

Internet Cyber Crime Grant (ICCG)

Authorization

The Internet Cyber Crime Grant (ICCG) Program was created pursuant to Chapter 650 RSMo, Section 650.120 and House Bill 1672. This program was developed by the State of Missouri in correlation with House Bill 1698, also known as Jessica's Law.

Administration

The Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director had oversight of the ICCG program.

Funding Allocation

Funds came from Missouri's General Revenue and were subject to legislative appropriation each year.

Eligible Program Areas

The Internet Cyber Crime Grant Program distributed funding to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control internet cyber crime as it relates to children and to improve public safety.

In 2007, funds could be used for the following purpose areas:

- Salaries of detectives and computer forensic personnel whose focus is investigating Internet Sex Crimes against children including but not limited to enticement of a child, possession or promotion of child pornography
- Training of law enforcement and forensic personnel to also include travel expenses

In 2008, funds could be used for the following purpose areas:

- Salaries (and overtime) of detectives and computer forensic personnel whose focus is investigating Internet Sex Crimes against children including but not limited to enticement of a child, possession or promotion of child pornography
- Training of law enforcement and forensic personnel to also include travel expenses
- Equipment directly related to preventing or combating cyber crime activities
- Supplies directly associated with operating a cyber crime task force and its activities

In 2009, funds could be used for the following purpose areas:

- Salaries (and overtime) of detectives and computer forensic personnel whose focus is investigating Internet Sex Crimes against children including but not limited to enticement of a child, possession or promotion of child pornography

- Training of law enforcement and forensic personnel to also include travel expenses
- Training of prosecuting and circuit attorneys as well as their assistant prosecuting and circuit attorneys to also include travel expenses
- Equipment directly related to preventing or combating cyber crime activities
- Supplies directly associated with operating a cyber crime task force and its activities

Eligible Applicants

Internet Cyber Crime Grant contracts administered by the Missouri Department of Public Safety were awarded to independently-recognized multi-jurisdictional task forces and local law enforcement agencies through their respective city or county unit of government.

Units of state or local government receiving ICCG funding for a law enforcement agency must be compliant with the following state statutes, amongst other things:

Local Match Requirement

ICCG recipients provided a match of 10% of the total project cost in the form of cash or in-kind donations of personnel, equipment, or supplies/operations.

Reporting Requirements

ICCG recipients were required to submit the following reports:

1. **Monthly Expenditure Report** for each month of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Claim reports must be submitted via mail or email by the 10th day following the reporting period. For example, a July claim report is due by August 10th.
2. **Progress Report** for each quarter of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Progress reports must be submitted via email by the 10th day following the reporting period.

Multi-Jurisdictional Cyber Crime Grant (MJCCG)

Authorization

To continue funding for multi-jurisdictional cyber crime task forces within the State of Missouri, the Department of Public Safety allocated monies from their FY 2009 Recovery-JAG award once the state appropriated ICCG program ceased.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act or ARRA) was signed into law by President Obama on February 17, 2009. The Recovery Act provided additional JAG funding.

The JAG Program is authorized under Title XI, Section 1111, Subtitle B of the federal Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005, as amended and reauthorized [Public Law 109-162, 42 U.S.C. § 3751(a)].

Administration

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) has oversight of the JAG program at the federal level.

The Department of Public Safety (DPS) has been designated by the governor of Missouri as the single state agency to receive, manage, and administer the JAG (Recovery-JAG and MJCCG) program in Missouri.

Funding Allocation

Funds were allocated by Congress in FY 2009 to provide states, tribes, and local governments with critical funding necessary to support a range of program areas.

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) calculated, for each state and territory, a minimum base allocation which then was enhanced by 1) the state's share of national population and 2) the state's share of the national Part 1 violent crime statistics. In addition, the formula was used to calculate direct allocations for local governments within Missouri, based on their share of population and the total violent crime reported within the state. The local governments entitled to at least \$10,000 awards were instructed to apply directly to the federal government for a local Recovery-JAG grant and are hereby ineligible to apply to DPS for MJCCG funding, unless the project is truly multi-jurisdictional in nature.

Of the amount awarded to Missouri, DPS is required to pass through a pre-determined percentage (58.53%) of JAG funds to units of local government, such as cities, counties, or townships.

Eligible Program Areas

MJCCG awards are allowable under the Law Enforcement purpose area of the Recovery-JAG program.

MJCCG monies are allocated for the sole purpose to make funds available to reduce internet crime against children and improve public safety through investigations, forensics, and prevention.

Funds may be used for any of the following budget categories:

- Personnel – salaries and/or overtime of detectives and computer forensic personnel whose focus is investigating internet sex crimes against children, including but not limited to, enticement of a child, possession or promotion of child pornography
- Travel – training of law enforcement and forensic personnel as well as prosecuting attorneys and circuit attorneys to also include the travel expenses of those persons participating in a cyber crime training program
- Equipment – items directly related to digital imaging, preventing, or combating cyber crime activities, or evidence storage
- Supplies/Operations – costs directly associated with operating a cyber crime task force and its activities
- Contractual – fees of a trainer or consultant to host training at the project agency site.

Eligible Applicants

Any unit of state or local government within Missouri is eligible to submit an application for funding for a multi-jurisdictional cyber crime task force. State-level applicants must have budgetary spending authority prior to submitting an application.

Units of state or local government receiving MJCCG funding for a law enforcement agency must be compliant with the following state statutes, amongst other things:

Local Match Requirement

There is no local match requirement on MJCCG monies.

Reporting Requirements

MJCCG recipients are required to submit the following reports:

1. **Claim** for each month of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Claim reports must be submitted via WebGrants by the 10th day following the reporting period. For example, a July claim report is due by August 10th.
2. **Status Report** for each quarter of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Status reports must be submitted via WebGrants by the 10th day following the reporting period. For example, the first quarter report (July to September) is due by October 10th.
3. **PMT Report** for each quarter of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, which comes first. PMT reports must be submitted via the BJA PMT website by the 15th day following the reporting period. For example, the first quarter report (July to September) is due by October 15th.

State Cyber Crime Grant (SCCG)

Administration

The SCCG program was created within the Missouri Department of Public Safety in FY13 from monies appropriated through House Bill 2008 to support the continued operation of multi-jurisdictional law enforcement cyber crime task forces.

Funding Allocation

Funds came from Missouri's General Revenue and are subject to legislative appropriation each year.

Eligible Program Areas

Funds may be used for any of the following budget categories:

- Personnel – salaries and/or overtime of detectives and computer forensic personnel whose focus is investigating internet sex crimes against children, including but not limited to, enticement of a child, possession or promotion of child pornography
- Travel – training of law enforcement and forensic personnel as well as prosecuting attorneys and circuit attorneys to also include the travel expenses of those persons participating in a cyber crime training program, focused on internet sex crimes against children
- Equipment – items directly related to digital imaging, preventing, or combating internet sex crimes against children activities, or evidence storage
- Supplies/Operations – costs directly associated with operating a cyber crime task force and its activities, focused on internet sex crimes against children
- Contractual – fees of a trainer or consultant to host training at the project agency site, focused on internet sex crimes against children

Eligible Applicants

Any unit of state or local government within Missouri is eligible to submit an application for funding for a multi-jurisdictional cyber crime task force.

Units of state or local government receiving SCCG funding for a law enforcement agency must be compliant with the following state statutes, amongst other things:

Local Match Requirement

There is no local match requirement on SCCG monies.

Reporting Requirements

SCCG recipients are required to submit the following reports:

1. **Claim** for each month of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Claim reports must be submitted via WebGrants by the 10th day following the reporting period.
2. **Status Report** for each quarter of the project period, or until the grant is programmatically and fiscally closed, whichever comes first. Status Reports must be submitted via WebGrants by the 10th day following the reporting period.
